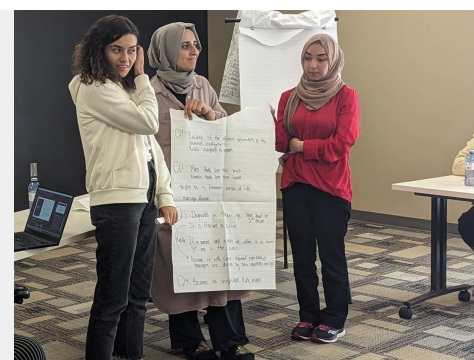

TAI TRAININGS

Through TAI, CMW provided key Muslim Cultural Sensitivity Training across municipalities, non-profits, and mental health settings, empowering local organizations to serve Muslim communities inclusively. Our Tea and Tales sessions provided a supportive environment for Muslim women to connect and share their stories, while awareness sessions in WRDSB schools helped build inclusivity and cultural understanding among students and staff. These initiatives have strengthened community ties and advanced our mission of combating Islamophobia.

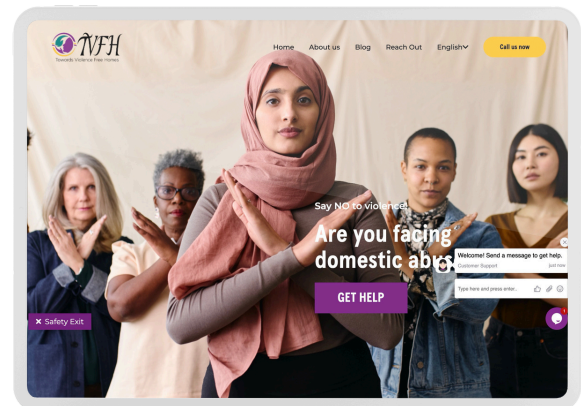


Towards Violence Free Homes (TVFH)

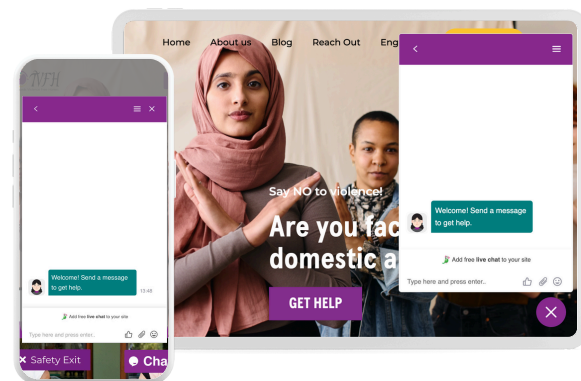
TVFH Website

Live Chat Tool

The live chat tool, available Monday to Friday from 10 am to 4 pm, allows visitors to engage directly with trained agents in multiple languages for information, community resources, or connections to CMW Community support workers providing essential support for newcomers and those facing language or technological challenges. Since the website's soft launch, this feature has facilitated over 100 meaningful interactions, underscoring its value in supporting those seeking assistance.

Towards Violence Free Homes (TVFH)

The Towards Violence-Free Homes (TVFH) program builds on the foundation of the Culturally Integrative Family Safety Response (CIFSR) initiative, playing a vital role in supporting Muslim and racialized women, girls, and families affected by gender-based violence. By connecting Violence Against Women (VAW) agencies with Muslim communities in the Waterloo region, TVFH addresses the unique challenges these groups face, ensuring culturally responsive support is accessible.



This year, TVFH strengthened partnerships with mainstream organizations gender-based violence survivors and collaborated with ethnocultural and faith-based groups to enhance inclusive services for gender-based violence survivors.

Thanks to the incredible efforts of the TVFH team and the generosity of our funders, we successfully delivered 146 engaging sessions to the community, reaching those in need with vital support and resources.

Leadership and Board Governance Training

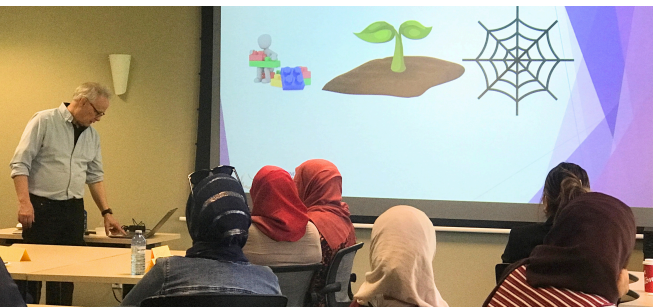


Thrive: An Employment Training Program For Muslim Women

Anti-Hate Services (AHS)

In 2023, the Coalition of Muslim Women's Anti-Hate Services Program led significant initiatives to promote inclusivity and combat hate. Key events included a vigil on June 6th to honor the Afzaal Family, attended by 140 people from diverse backgrounds. The program also launched the reportinghate.ca website and released the second Annual Snapshot of Hate report. Outreach efforts expanded to marginalized communities, including Afghan, Turkish, Arab, Black African, Asian, Jewish groups, and new immigrants.

The program updated its materials to address emerging issues like Antisemitism and collaborated with the Waterloo Region Jewish Community Council.

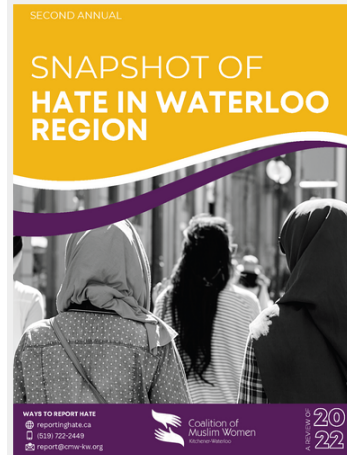
Honouring the Afzaal Family

Vigil on June 6th to honor the Afzaal Family, which was attended by 140 individuals from diverse communities. The vigil featured speakers representing different backgrounds, including interfaith leaders. Concurrently, the program launched its new website for reportinghate.ca and shared and published the 2nd Annual Report of 2022, detailing a snapshot of hate.



Snapshot of Hate in Waterloo Region – Second Annual Report

Over the course of 2022, a total of 97 unique incidents were reported through the Hate or Discrimination Documentation and Reporting Service operated by CMW. The breakdown of reporting showed that 34 informants chose to report anonymously on the website; whereas 63 choose to report in ways that connected them to staff at CMW.

Advocacy Highlights

Amira Elghawaby Visit

CMW hosted Amira Elghawaby, Canada's Special Representative to Combat Islamophobia for a meeting with local leaders to discuss Waterloo Region's strategy and readiness to counter Islamophobia.



National Day of Remembrance of the Quebec City Mosque

CMW hosted a townhall with Waterloo Region Police Services and the community on January 29, which is the National Day of Remembrance of the Quebec City Mosque and Day of Action against Islamophobia. The townhall was aimed at providing a platform for community members to ask questions directly the WRPS Chief and staff about action plans to counter Islamophobia



Advocacy Highlights

Region of Waterloo's Code of Conduct Bylaw

Amendment of Region of Waterloo's Code of Conduct ByLaw: TAI staff worked with Region of Waterloo staff to develop a proposed amendment to the Code of Use Bylaw that would prohibit hateful behavior on Regional property.

The bylaw amendment was passed in October 2023. CMW was instrumental in recommending this amendment, based on their recommendations to counter Islamophobia after the murders of the Azaal family in London in 2021.

The CMW extended this to include not just anti-Muslim hate, but to apply to all the 17 protected grounds from the Ontario Human Rights Code.

Advocacy for the Drive Test Center

Press conference with NCCM to highlight the racist assault faced by TAI coordinator Mifrah Abid at the Kitchener Drive Test Center.

CMW, in collaboration with Porchlight Counselling Services developed and delivered a 6-hour training to Mental Health Practitioners from across Waterloo Region.

CMW's Standardization Project: The TAI team is aiming to copyright/ trademark and standardize CMW's trainings which are developed in-house.

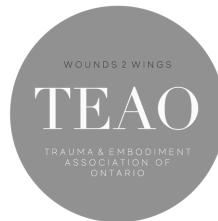
